#### WHO IS TEXAS COLLEGE?

Texas College offers 14 programs of study in liberal arts and sciences: 12 Baccalaureate Degree programs and two Associate in Arts programs. Students can study within one of four major divisions — Business and Social Sciences, Education, General Studies and Humanities, and Natural and Computational Sciences. In addition to traditional academic programs, the College offers specialized programs that meet the needs of non-traditional students: the SUCCESS Program, an accelerated modular Degree Completion Program in Business Administration (for adults who desire to obtain their Bachelor's degree while fulfilling their work and family obligations) and the post-baccalaureate alternative Teacher Education Certification program.

Some of the best educators in the country received their formal education at Texas College. The College's science and social science programs prepare students seeking professional careers in Computer Science, Medicine, and Law. In addition, the business acumen acquired by graduates of the College's Business program has led them to productive and highly successful careers in a variety of business arenas. The College has established and continues to operate a superb Teacher Education program.

Paramount to the College's goal of improving access to higher education, Texas College remains resolute in its commitment to the policy of open admissions; therefore, the College provides a comprehensive student learning program that includes early assessment of learning needs, academic advisement, study skills assistance, tutoring, and personal guidance through the First and Second Year Program.


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# The President's Pen

### **HBCUs Make America Strong:**

### THE POSITIVE ECONOMIC IMPACT OF **TEXAS COLLEGE**

Texas College is a valuable economic engine in its community, generating substantial economic returns year after year. The benefits flow to Texas College's graduates, of course, who'll enter the workforce with sharper skills and vastly enhanced earning prospects. But, as a landmark study commissioned by UNCF— HBCUs Make America Strong: The Positive Economic Impact of Historically Black Colleges and Universities—makes clear, the benefits also flow to the local and regional economies that are connected to Texas College.

The presence of an HBCU means a boost to economic activity, on and off—and even well beyond—campus. Stronger growth. Stronger communities. More jobs. And a more talented workforce.



### The study's key findings (based on 2014 data) make a persuasive case:

### Total Economic Impact: \$25 Million

- 🐧 Texas College generates \$25 million in *total* economic impact for its local and regional economies. This estimate includes direct spending by Texas College on faculty, employees, academic programs and operations—and by students attending the institution, as well as the follow-on effects of that spending.
- 👸 Every dollar spent by Texas College and its students produces positive economic benefits, generating \$1.27 in initial and subsequent spending for its local and regional economies. Communities and regions hoping to foster a more robust and diversified economic climate find HBCU-connected spending a critical component of that effort.

### Total Employment Impact: 282 Jobs

- 🚧 Texas College generates 282 jobs for its local and regional economies. Of this total, 139 are on-campus jobs, and 143 are off-campus jobs.
- 🟧 For each job created on campus, another 1.0 public- or private-sector job is created off campus because of Texas College-related spending.
- 🖴 Looked at in a different way: Each \$1 million initially spent by Texas College and its students creates 15 jobs.

### Total Lifetime Earnings for Graduates: \$243 Million

- Texas College plays a major role in the economic success of its graduates by enhancing their education, training and leadership skills. A college degree opens the door to economic prosperity through greater employment and earnings potential. In fact, the 101 Texas College graduates in 2014 can expect total earnings of \$243 million over their lifetimes—that's 67 percent more than they could expect to earn without their college credentials.
- Or viewed on an individual basis, a Texas College graduate working full time throughout his or her working life can expect to earn \$969,000 in additional income due to a college credential.

This estimate reflects incremental earnings averaged across degree and certificate programs.

With the dorms at maximum capacity, classes began on the 22nd. The campus was full of energy, students were eager to learn, faculty members were excited to teach and staff members were enthusiastic to assist as classes kicked off for the semester. The campus was full and bustling with a diverse student engaged in the Texas College of intellectual, experience psychological, social and spiritual development.

### **Opening School Convocation**

Texas College held their Opening School Convocation on Wednesday, September 19, 2018 at 11:00 a.m. in the Gus F. Taylor Gymnasium. This annual formal academic event serves to officially recognize and celebrate the beginning of the academic year, as well as, welcome new students to the Texas College Family. Aligning with the College's mission and faith-based founding, all new students were gifted a Bible from Texas College.

The incoming class of Fall 2018 boasts the largest enrollment seen in recent years, with grade point averages at an all-time high. This sizable class of new students increased enrollment to 1,044 students, the largest experienced under Dr. Fennell's administration. While the record is exciting for the

Fennell, his executive cabinet, City of Tyler Councilman Ed Moore, Texas College National Alumni Association President Gwendolyn Collins, SGA President Malcolm Patton, Jr. and Miss Texas College Relicia Morrison. Q'Juan Gray, Senior Buyer for NCH Corporation in Irving, Texas and former TCNAA President, served as the speaker for the occasion.

Campus. The forum officially kicked off the Emerging Leaders Program, which is designed to build leadership skills and inspire students to get involved in the organizations and causes they are passionate about on campus, in the Tyler community, and beyond.

The keynote speaker for 2018's forum was Dr. Kent L. Willis. Willis is an educator, coach and mentor currently serving as Associate Provost for Institutional Effectiveness at The University of Texas Health Science Center at Tyler. He is also active in the community and an alumnus of Leadership Tyler Class 31. With experience in secondary and post-secondary education, his research interests include college and career readiness, as well as school-based health promotion and education policy. Actively involved in research and scholarship, he serves as a reviewer for academic journals published by the National Council of Professors of Educational Administration (NCPEA) and the Collaborative Educational Programs for the Americas (CEPA).

Dr. Willis encouraged the student leaders to become the difference they want to see in the world. He reminded them that leadership is not an easy task and that they must align themselves with people who continually strive for excellence. The students were also allowed to ask Dr. Willis questions and seek advice on how to become more effective and efficient leaders

In late October, Texas College signed a memorandum of understanding with the UT Health Science Center at Tyler, which created the UT Health/Texas College Pre-Health Academy. The Pre-Health Academy will provide students seeking advanced degrees in health-related careers (e.g., medicine, public health, dentistry, pharmacy, physical therapy, sports medicine, etc.) with a pathway to prepare for further study. Students will be afforded opportunities to gain exposure to the breadth and depth of various health-related fields through research, experiential learning, job shadowing. volunteerism and experiences. The Academy will also assist with MCAT and GRE test preparation to ensure quality scores. Students will have structured opportunities to:

- 1) Link theory and practice through clinical experience and research.
- 2) Explore the depth and breadth of various health-related disciplines.
- 3) Receive guidance and support through mentorship

### Texas College Partners with the Dallas County Community College District



Texas College and the Dallas County Community College District (DCCCD) have signed a credit transfer agreement that provides DCCCD students with a pipeline to Bachelor's degrees at Texas College. Applicants successfully completing an articulated pathway in the Associate in Arts or Associate in Science with a 2.0 or better grade point average will now have a seamless transition into the Bachelor's degree programs at Texas College. The articulated pathways include Business Administration, Computer Science, Biology, Criminal Justice, Music and Sociology.

Glass Library, in partnership with the Division of General Studies and Humanities, received a grant from the East Texas Communities Foundation, Inc. in the amount of \$10,000; the funds sponsored an oral history project entitled "Tyler's African American Voices: Their Stories, Our History". As a part of the project, 23 residents of North Tyler and the Texas College District were interviewed to document the community's history. The interviews were recorded digitally and deposited for scholarly use in the D. R. Glass Library, as well as the Tyler Public Library. In addition to the oral history project, development of the second publication of the journal entitled "The Connector" was also produced.

### Dr. Ray McDonald Speaks at Panola County Senior Expo

Further, he provided thorough descriptions of factors leading to Alzheimer's, stage progression and combinations of medication and therapy that could help delay symptom progression. Dr. McDonald has also published a book on the subject, Understanding the Alzheimer's Patient: Coping and Strategies, to help both the patient and caregiver understand the disease and its effects.

Head Men's Basketball Coach, Marquet Norfleet, spoke at the Grand Prairie ISD College and Career Readiness College Night on Thursday, September 20th. Norfleet held multiple sessions throughout the evening, speaking to over 2,000 high school student-athletes. Norfleet also emphasized the importance of obtaining a college degree, "You can't major in basketball, or football, or any other sport. You are a student-athlete. 
